

Reasoning in natural language


Example: Sherlock Holmes

"You appeared to be surprised when I told you, on our first meeting, that you had come from Afghanistan."

"You were told, no doubt."

"Nothing of the sort. I knew you came from Afghanistan. From long habit the train of thoughts ran so swiftly through my mind, that I arrived at the conclusion without being conscious of intermediate steps. There were such steps, however. The train of reasoning ran, "Here is a gentleman of a medical type, but with the air of a military man. Clearly an army doctor then. He has just come from the tropics, for his face is dark, and that is not the natural tint of his skin, for his wrists are fair. He has undergone hardship and sickness, as his haggard face says clearly. His left arm has been injured. He holds it in a stiff and unnatural manner. Where in the tropics could an English army doctor have seen much hardship and got his arm wounded? Clearly in Afghanistan." The whole train of thought did not occupy a second. I then remarked that you came from Afghanistan, and you were astonished."

Reasoning in "natural language"

Reasoning is objective but difficult



1. If George belongs to the terrorist group True Patriots, then he would most likely read the National Pride Today forum. George does read the National Pride forum; therefore, he probably belongs to the True Patriots.
2. Sarah won't defect unless Frank does. Frank is going to defect. Therefore Sarah will also.
3. The suspect engaged in activities of security relevance, resulting in an investigation which found the suspect not to be engaged in any activities that pose a security concern.
4. The Chinese government tried to cover up the origins of the corona virus. The most likely explanation for the cover up is that it originated from a lab. Therefore, coronavirus originated in a lab.



IN SPIITE OF the classical texts that Symonds was reading in the Bodleian Library or in his tutors' quarters, the drumbeats in the morning papers echoed through the common rooms. The same year, sentences handed down at the Old Bailey for "the attempt" at sodomy started to extend in length, from a year to eighteen months. And teenagers were now convicted more often: indeed, that year, fourteen-year-old Thomas Silver was actually executed for committing sodomy. The boy "was indicted for an unnatural offence [. . .] GUILTY—Death recorded."

This is the first time the phrase "unnatural offence" entered the Old Bailey records.

Then the language changed again, and the highly charged Biblical word "abominable" appeared in the formerly matter-of-fact court re-

Validity and uncertainty

When we reason, every claim has a degree of certainty.

- This can either be stated explicitly or left undefined and understood by the context.
 - “I am 80% confident that Trump will lose the election”
 - “I know that World War Two ended in 1945.”

We can rank beliefs, and we can determine fair bets to place on them

- The range of uncertainty can be quite large
 - but it can't get too large without the claim becoming uninformative and unable to play a role in reasoning.
- In reasoning, degree of certainty means the probability that the claim is true *given* the reasons or evidence presented.

Reasoning in natural language

Example: degree of support

Reason:

China has moved troops close to Hong Kong.

therefore


Conclusion:

China is planning to stop the protests using force.



Reasoning in natural language

Example: degree of support



Socrates was a philosopher and philosophers are boring,
therefore Socrates was boring.

Socrates was a philosopher and most, maybe 80%, of
philosophers are boring, therefore, it is very likely that he
was boring.

Reasoning in natural language

Good reasoning and precision



Samantha is a politician who accepts donations from a foreign adversarial country, publicly defends the actions of that country, regularly holidays in that country, communicates regularly and covertly with top officials from that country, and tries to minimize knowledge of her financial connections to that country.

What should we conclude?

1. It is certain that Samantha is spying for that country.
2. Maybe Samantha is spying for that country.
3. There is a 50% chance that Samantha is spying for that country.
4. There is a 20 - 70% chance that Samantha is spying for that country.





Example: Inference to best explanation

It can hardly be supposed that a false theory would explain, in so satisfactory a manner as does the theory of natural selection, the several large classes of facts above specified [e.g., the geographical distribution of species, the sterility of hybrid species]. It has recently been objected that this is an unsafe method of arguing. But it is a method used in judging common events of life, and has often been used by the greatest natural philosophers. The undulatory theory of light has thus been arrived at; and the belief of the revolution of the earth on its own axis was until lately supported by hardly any direct evidence.

IBE needs to:

- 1) provide a comprehensive list of the plausible explanations,
- 2) detail the information to be explained,
- 3) weigh up the information that determine which explanation is the best one for the information.

George is planning a terrorist attack because that is the best explanation for his recent behaviour.

Reasoning Stratagems

IBE (aka Abduction)

Inferences to best explanation need to:

1. Provide a comprehensive list of the information to be explained.

Will often need to make the distinction between things that are crucial and need to be explained, and those things which are more incidental, but that a full explanation will cover.


2. Determine which explanations are plausible

If a plausible explanation is overlooked, it may be the correct one.

3. Consider which explanation is best, which is generally a function of:

Their relative plausibility based on the “background” information

Their explanatory power.



Reasoning Stratagems

Example: TV & Depression




Hours watching TV correlates with depression.
Therefore, TV causes depression.

Generalisations need to:

- Explain how reliably the information has been collected.
- Explain why the amount of information is sufficient for the conclusion.
- Establish that the information has been collected from a sample or group representative of the group you are making a conclusion about.
- Consider exceptional circumstances.

Reasoning Stratagems

Categorising cases

This is the type of argument where a generalisation is applied to an instance and used to make conclusions about it.

These arguments need to:

- Establish that the generalisation is acceptable
- Clearly explain how the instance in question is a case of the thing the generalisation is about.

Reasoning Stratagems

Appeal to Analogy

An argument from analogy needs to:

- Explain how the two situations are sufficiently similar
 - Explaining the relevant similarities
 - And that the differences are unrelated to the matter at hand
- Generally, explain how the same causal pathway could be present in both cases
 - Otherwise an argument from analogy is generalisation from insufficient data.




Reasoning Stratagems

Argument by Elimination

An argument by elimination needs to:

- Provide a complete list of the options
 - Missing one option invalidates the method
- Establish that all but one of them is unacceptable
 - Each option needs to be dealt with separately; this mode of reasoning does not work by comparing options
 - Needs to be able to eliminate options with a high degree of certainty.



An appeal to sources needs to do the following:

- Accurately state what the source claims
- Establish that the source is in a position to know the claim
- Establish that the source is reporting honestly in this case.


